Time for a Little Crappie Magic

It looks like we are done with the snow, but that water is still pretty cold. The cohos and walleyes are active, but this is the perfect time to

get after those tasty crappies. I've heard about his guy they call "The Crappie Professor" and at the April Arlington Anglers Meeting, Jim Kopjo lived up to his billing and shared his amazing crappie knowledge that can be used starting right now!

GENERAL:

Crappies usually school up and are very competitive. If they are hitting your presentation move on to the next spot. Use sensitive rods, 4

-6 pound line, light jigs, small plastics/tube jigs (minnows if you prefer later), one or two split shot, and small floats to put the bait right above those crappies shown on your fish finder. The prime temperature is 62-68 degrees, but the crappies are active already.

WHERE:

Find the cleanest, warmest water in spring. Remember that rain will reduce the water temp. Slow down your presentations. Retention ponds are hot right now. Look where the warm water enters, isolated bays, etc. Lakes like Shabbona and Evergreen are picking up too. Crappies love structure, so look for those submerged trees, cribs, and weeds.

PRE-FISHING WORK:

Use all available maps, GPS, and the best depth-finder you can afford.

Side scanning is amazing. Take detailed notes on your maps for the next trip or season. Crappies are predictable. Talk to the local bait shops. If they won't share info, look at which color jig/plastic is running short on the shelves.

> bers are effective when crappies are in shallow water or when you need precise depth control. Lastly when the crappies are spread out, try drifting or even trolling with small crank baits at the first drop-off.
