Arlington Anglers Ensure Fishing for The Future

As the weather warms, virtually every lake, river, pond, and creek is coming to life once more. New green weed beds are replacing the brown dead ones. Schools of minnows turn the water black as they swim by. Frogs are jumping into the water as you walk on the shore. Insects are landing on the water. Bass and panfish can be seen in the shallows building their spawning nests. The conditions are perfect and the fish are ready to cooperate, but what can we do to make sure that fishing will continue to flourish?

Practice Selective Harvest: With all of the information, equipment, and technology available to every fisherman, it makes it possible to catch many fish (and many large fish) on any body of water. Fisheries Studies have shown that heavy fishing pressure and harvest can make a very significant impact on the fish population. Make a plan for when, where, and what to keep for dinner. Larger fish are typically the best reproducers. If we want healthy fish populations with diverse size structure for the next decades, selective harvest is best, especially in the spawning periods.

Use Good Catch and Release Techniques: Again Fisheries Studies have conclusively shown that a good Catch and Release can allow a fish to be caught multiple times. This only works if the fish survives using these tips: Use an adequate landing net and have needle-nose pliers or other hook removing devices on hand. Keep the fish in the water as much as possible. Wet your hands before touching a fish. Support bigger fish with your hand under its belly both in the boat and as you release. Follow Fishing Regulations: Read and be familiar with the Fishing Regulations for your state (minimum size, max quantities, and dates). Some lakes/river have specific regulations different that the standard regs. The rules are made to sustain the populations but don't feel that you need to take home the max. Take what you need for dinner.

Take Someone Fishing: Fishing is a great outdoor activity that connect humans to each other and to nature. Through fishing we learn about our role in the environment and the need for a clean water habitat. It also gives us a chance to bring home an occasional meal that completes the circle of experience that few others can. Introduce someone new to fishing this year and teach them the ways to keep fishing flourishing in the years to come.
