

Bob's Fishing Report By: Bob Diebold



Back to Winter? Or is Spring right around the corner?

AREA LAKES AND PONDS:

Open water. On warm sunny days, LM bass have been active on jigs, crank baits and jerk baits. Crappies starting to get active on Wax worms or a chena bait under a slip float worked along the outside weed lines.

CHAIN O'LAKES: Crappies just starting up. Some channel catfish and white bass showing up. Water is high and cold. **CHICAGO LAKE FRONT:**

Powerlines or rods & reels doing very good for cohos using spawn sacs, shrimp, wax worms, minnows. Some are taking occasional steelheads or brown trout.

IL LAKE MICHIGAN: Coho action good from Hammond to Michigan city fishing the beach to 35ft of water using thinfish, j-9 Rapalas and a variety of shallow running crankbaits.

FOX RIVER: High water causing NO WAKE. Walleyes caught at the McHenry Dam. Jig and a fat head minnow best. As soon as the skim ice leaves the channels, crappie and BGs will start.

DELAVAN, COMO, GENEVA:Open water for shallow BGs, crappies, and occasional accidental bass or musky.

BRAIDWOOD: LM Bass good on finesse baits and bluegills good on drop shots.

HEIDECKE: Opens April 1st. **FOREST PRESERVES:** Spring inland trout season

starts April 1st.

WISCONSIN RIVER: Open moving water has yielded some walleyes and saugers.

GREEN BAY: Walleyes active in the river at DePere.

NORTHERN WISCONSIN: Still can find lots of good ice and the fish have been cooperating. STURGEON BAY: Forget about the whitefish. Shallow bay ice has yielded perch and pike.

Last Month's Speaker Tips By: Brian O'Connor





This column provides several of the many takeaways from the last month's speaker. Derek Boeger is the Head Guide at Alexander Sport Fishing on Green Bay. He also has his own service, Derek Boeger Fishing. Derek was talking about where to find walleyes on Green Bay.

Wind direction and water temp were central themes. 3-4 days of the same wind direction will tell you where to start fishing, either the East or West shore. The wind blown shoreline will have the warmer water that attracts swarms of baitfish. The predators will follow them and won't be far behind.

He advises to be smart about going out as Green Bay is a big body of water. 10-15 mph winds are the max for safe and effective fishing. Derek says the "Wind Alert" app is great for tracking wind patterns.

While trolling with Flicker Minnows using snap weights and planer boards can still be productive, Derek mostly Spot Locks his trolling motor and casts. He says there is a lot of structure to target and many fish stay close to the bottom chasing the abundant gobies.

Derek loves Shiver Minnows and Bink's Spoons for walleyes. He leans towards the more cost conscious spoons as the Shiver Minnows are expensive and the "wings" are a bit too fragile.

The most important aspect of these types of lures is that they need to hit bottom on a slack line. He uses a mono or flouro leader to reduce line hook.

The technique is to cast far out and pop the lure off the bottom letting it flutter back down with slack. Fish pin the bait to the bottom during the pause. The next pop may well be fish on!

February Meeting Raffle Winners

Rolling Meadows Fishing Flea Market Report

Illinois Catchable Trout Opener is April 1st



The IL Spring trout season opens on April 1st at 58 ponds, streams, and lakes across the state. The Illinois DNR stocks more than 80,000 rainbow trout. Fishing starts at 5 AM. More info and a list of locations can be found on the Illinois.gov website. Google "Illinois trout opener" to find a direct link.

This is extremely popular with the banks lined early. Most fish are caught the first day but are possible for a few days after. An IL license and inland trout stamp are req'd.

Small inline spinners, spoons, minnows under floats, and trout bites all can take fish.

Big Fish of the Month



Big Fish of the Month goes to Craig Janes for his feisty 29" Steelhead.

Craig was fishing below the Berrien Springs Dam on the St. Joe River, near the fish ladder.

Anchored in about 6 FOW, a combination of lipped crankbaits held in the current and spawn bags on the bottom took several fish, this one the largest.


